A Parent's Worst Nightmare

As parents we have worries and concerns about so many things in regard to our children. But one of the top worries is that our children will be the victims of sexual abuse.

As we enter the month of April, the DV/SV world recognizes two important "awareness" months: Sexual Assault Awareness Month and Child Abuse Prevention Month. So let's take a look at some concrete steps that parents can take to minimize the chances of sexual abuse happening to their children.

One of the most important things you can do to help your child is to have open communication. This means not being afraid to have conversations about potentially uncomfortable topics, The American Academy of Pediatrics gives the following age-appropriate guidelines for conversations to have with your child:

- ◆ **18 months**—Teach the names of all body parts, including proper names for those that are "private".
- 3-5 years— Teach about private parts and to say "no" to any touch that makes the child uncomfortable.
- ◆ 5-8 years— Discuss safety guidelines for when parents are not present, including the concept of "bathing suit " areas covering private parts. Teach respect for others' bodies as well.
- ♦ 8-12 years— Talk about potentially dangerous areas such as public restrooms, malls, locker rooms, social media sites, and isolated places.
- ◆ 13-18 years—Encourage open discussion about sexual assault as well as your family's standards of sexual conduct.

In general, teaching your child to have respect for his/her body, and to have the skills to maintain appropriate boundaries is one of the most important prevention skills we can offer. So is it ok for your child to refuse a hug from a loved one? Experts say yes it is - just help your child learn how to do so respectfully and be ready to intervene on behalf of your child if situations become difficult. Allowing children to decide who they give affection to helps them to be more capable of protecting themselves in unsafe situations. Not everyone will see this as an acceptable practice, but it is our job as parents to advocate for our kids!

It's also important to encourage your child to be forthcoming about experiences that they may be unsure about, especially when it relates to uncomfortable touches. Knowing that some offenders encourage the child to keep the encounters a secret, a good strategy is to help your child distinguish between secrets that might result in someone being hurt/upset and surprises that will make people happy: (birthday surprises, etc.).

It is a fact that most sexual offenders are known to the child, so it's important to realize that it might be difficult for children to distinguish between acceptable and inappropriate touches. Giving our children some of these important tools can help to lessen the chances of abuse and increase our children's chances of a safer childhood.

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Survivor Story

Tyler Perry

Famous actor, screenwriter, playwright, director, author, songwriterall of these roles describe Tyler Perry. But his lesser known role is that of childhood sexual abuse survivor. Perry began speaking out about his childhood some years ago when he appeared on *Oprah* in 2010, as part of her effort to shed light on the topic of male sexual assault.

At that time he spoke candidly about both his physical and sexual abuse as a child; Perry used to endure severe physical beatings from his father, and described his life with his father as a "living hell". In addition to that, four different adults sexually abused him between the ages of 5 and 10. The men who molested Perry were an adult neighbor, a nurse, and a man from his church; the man from church used the Bible and God to justify the abuse after performing oral sex on Perry. His first sexual experience with a woman happened when the mother of one of his friends assaulted him at age 10.

Perry carried all of this trauma inside himself until after his mother passed away in 2009. He knew that revealing his abuse would cause her pain, and was not willing to inflict that on her. We are grateful to Perry for having the courage to step forward and share his experiences in an effort to further the dialogue about male childhood abuse survivors.

Denim Day

Mark your calendars now for April 24 as a day to wear your jeans to work, while raising money for Response! Every year for the past 20 years the non-profit organization, Peace Over Violence, has run this campaign as an effort to raise awareness of and protest against the erroneous and destructive attitudes about sexual assault. This campaign was developed in response to a 1998 ruling by the Italian Supreme Court where a rape conviction was overturned because the victim was wearing jeans; their reasoning was that a rapist would not be able to remove a victim's tight jeans without help from the victim herself, so the sex must have been consensual. The day following the ruling, the women in the Italian Parliament protested by wearing jeans and holding protest signs. The movement quickly spread to the US, and Denim Day is now a well-established event. So talk with your employer to see if they would be willing
